Cover Verse: "Jesus is not here. He has risen." Luke 24:6

"Remember how he told you, while he was still with you in Galilee."

Luke 24:6 holds immense significance in the Christian faith. In the context of the resurrection of Jesus, this verse captures the essence of the angel's message to the women who visited the tomb.

- "He is not here; he has risen!": These words resonate with hope and victory. The tomb was empty because Jesus had conquered death. His resurrection validated His identity as the Son of God and fulfilled the prophecies about the Messiah.
- "Remember how he told you...": The angel prompts the women to recall Jesus' teachings. During His ministry, Jesus had repeatedly foretold His death and resurrection (see <u>Matthew 16:21</u>, <u>Mark 9:31</u>, and <u>Luke 9:22</u>). His words were not forgotten; they were now coming to fruition.
- "...while he was still with you in Galilee.": The reference to Galilee reminds the women of their encounters with Jesus during His earthly ministry. It emphasizes continuity—Jesus' promise of resurrection was made long before His crucifixion.

From time immemorial, people have asked whether there is life after death and, if so, what kind of life it would be. Some have suggested that life simply ends in nothingness. For them, the world is just a war-torn and violent waiting room where death has the last word.

We, Christians, on the other hand, today shout "Alleluia" because Jesus Christ has been raised from the dead. His Resurrection is neither a myth nor a dream. It wasn't a vision. Nor is it a fairy tale. It is a singular and unrepeatable event in the history of the cosmos.

At Easter, we celebrate that He conquered sin and death, opening us to a future of hope. Thanks to Him, evil has been robbed of its power; failure can no longer hold us back from starting anew; and death has become a passage to eternal life.

This Easter, the Church invites us to relive the thrilling experience of the disciples who encountered Jesus as a living Person. Today, we too can encounter Him.

He might be right there before us: in a troubled son or daughter; a difficult spouse or family situation; a neglected person clamoring for our attention. He is waiting to be encountered as the Risen Lord, but He wears many disguises. He is found in the poor, the sick, the trafficked, the addicted, the imprisoned, the abandoned, the homeless, and the marginalized in our midst.

As Bishop Robert Barron has written: "It all comes down finally to this: if Jesus was not raised from death, Christianity is a joke. But if he did rise from death, then Christianity is the fullness of God's revelation, and Jesus must be the absolute center of our lives. There is no third option."

If you sincerely seek the Lord, rest assured that you will find Him. Indeed, He will come to find you, to meet you. Calling you by name, He will take you into the intimacy of His love and ask you, in return, to share your experience with others.



Luke 5:32—Jesus answered, "Those who are well have no need of a physician, but those who are sick do; I have come to call not the righteous but sinners to repentance." Lent is the time for repentance, a time for coming back to God and taking his loving & forgiving heart. He is inviting us to receive His healing grace.

Trivia: For the first time since 2018, Ash Wednesday and Valentine's Day fell on the same day in 2024. It has happened three times in the last century <math>-1923, 1934, and 1945 - and will happen again in 2029.

Mark 9:2-10—The Transfiguration of our Lord Jesus. What a remarkable sight! This gives us faith & hope to continue with our spiritual journey. This gives us a foretaste of the promised kingdom. Our Lord proved that even if He suffered on the cross, He would rise again in glory.

Jesus will be giving away His self, lavishly & unconditionally on the cross.

John 18:1-19.42—The Seven last words of Jesus on the cross are a powerful reminder of His love & the ultimate sacrifice He made for us to redeem us from our sins.

John 20:1-9—The Resurrection of our Lord Jesus confirmed that He is the Son of God & the Savior of the world. He conquered death and sin and offered eternal life to all those who believe in Him.

CENACULO: a Filipino tradition of the life, passion & death of Jesus Christ

The Cenaculo, also known as Senakulo, is a traditional Filipino dramatization that re-enacts the life, passion, and death of Jesus Christ. This poignant performance takes place during the Lenten season and holds deep cultural significance in the Philippines. Here are some key points about the Senakulo:

Origin and Meaning: The term "cenaculo" is derived from Spanish and refers to the place where Jesus and his disciples celebrated the Last Supper. The Senakulo is also known as *pasyon y muerte* (passion and death) in various regions of the Philippines.

Performance Format: The Senakulo is presented through singing (*pasyon*) and recitation. It is typically performed in public squares, houses, and streets. The dramatization unfolds during the 40-day Lenten period, leading up to Easter Sunday.

Traditional Elements: *Pabasa* - Participants chant the lines from an early 16th-century epic poem called *Pasyon*. This poem narrates the life, passion, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. The Senakulo is often performed on a proscenium-type stage with painted cloth or paper backdrops known as *telon*. Traditional portrayals depict Christ as meek and humble, submitting to his fate in obedience to authority.

Modern Adaptations: In the urban areas, modernized versions of the Senakulo run for shorter durations, often just one or two hours. These adaptations may incorporate elements of comedy, romance, and special effects. Unlike the traditional focus on Christ's submissiveness, modern Senakulos emphasize his reason and resolve in standing up for the oppressed against their oppressors.


